



Popular Parks

first, but when you look closer you can see that it doesn't have any cars. Instead of tracks, it has stairs. You walk the entire ride. You can't get any slower than that. Finally, we turn to the roller coaster that started it all: Switchback Railway at Coney Island, New York. It was a long, straight track that was used to deliver coal. Some people were wondering why the coal got to have all the fun and started jumping in the cars. It was officially opened as a roller coaster in 1884. Those are some of the most famous roller coasters.

Roller Coaster Safety

Some people might be annoved about the height limits on roller coasters, but they are actually for your own safety. Some rides aren't safe for people who are shorter because the cars are too big for shorter people. It could also be that the seatbelt won't hold the rider in if they don't reach the height limit. Some rides have maximum height restrictions where you can't be too tall. These are to make sure that the ride can hold your weight, or so that your knees won't be jammed in case of an emergency. There are a few other safety precautions that roller coasters have. They are tested for safety in the morning before the park is opened to the public. First, the park owners will walk around the track to make sure that there is no debris, leaves, or anything else on the track that would stop the cars from moving. Then, they check to make sure that all of the screws are tight enough. They also make sure that all of the bars and straps are tightly on the cars. Finally, they will run the ride a few times by putting bags of sand in the seats. If there are any conflicts with these tests, they will repair the ride. If the ride cannot be repaired in time, it will be closed while they fix it. Now everyone should be assured that roller coasters are safe.

Are you afraid of roller coasters, or do you love them? There usually is no in between. But now that you know about the different parks, a few famous roller coasters, and the safety precautions, you might have a very enjoyable (and scary) summer. So go jump on a roller coaster (or don't) and have a great time!


Pros:

The Soldier Who Didn't Surrender Until 1974

Hiroo Onoda was an Imperial Japanese Army intelligence officer. He was trained at the Nagano School. He fought in World War II and didn't surrender in August 1945.

There have been many Japanese soldiers in the Pacific Theatre who didn't surrender because of their militaristic indoctrination, or because they didn't know about the surrender. Hiroo Onoda was the last of them. They were called remaining Japanese soldiers (残留日本 in Japanese) on Zappy pippophei (in English

兵 in Japanese) or Zanryū nipponhei (in English

Japanese pronunciation).

Hiroo Onoda was sent to the Lubang Island, near Luzon, in the Philippines in late 1944. He met up with a group of other

Japanese soldiers on the island. A man named Major Yoshimi Taniguchi had given him orders to live off the land, and refused him to die by his own hand.

He said to Onoda **"It** may take three years, it

may take five, but whatever happens to you, we will come back for you. Until then, so long as you have one soldier, you are to continue to lead them."

Higher ranking officers made Onoda unable to carry out his mission to sabotage the enemy airstrip and pier at the harbor. This made the US campaign on the island, which happened on February 1945, easier. When the US forces came to the island, the large group split up into smaller groups, mostly of 3-4 men. Most of the men were taken down by the American troops or surrendered. The only people who escaped was Hiroo Onoda and three other people who were under his command. Their names were Private Yuichi Akatsu, Corporal Shoichi Shimada, and Private First Class Kinshichi Kozuka. The four men set up bases in the mountains.

Once Japan had surrendered in September 1945, Onoda and his group came across a number of leaflets. The first one was left by locals and was discovered quite soon. It said, "The war ended on August 15th. Come down from the mountain!" However, they thought it was an Allied propaganda trick.

After what they have thought was true, the group continued to raid the local islanders for food and other types of resources. General Tomoyuki Yamashita of the Fourteenth Area Army dropped leaflets from the air with an order to surrender. Once again, the group thought it was another trick. Without knowing about the atomic bomb on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, it seemed unlikely that Japan was willing to surrender.

In 1949, Private Yuichi Akatsu had escaped from the group and surrendered to Filipino force a year later in 1950. This made the three others be cautious about disloyalty. Later, in 1952 the search mission of the group grew larger with letters and pictures of group's families dropped from an aircraft, but again, this was thought of as a trick. Every piece of evidence the group came across increased their hostility. Even when they were dressed up in the Imperial Japanese uniforms, the people who they came across were in civilian clothing. They even thought of the civilians as Allied soldiers disguised in order to lure them out, and because of this, they didn't care when they were firing at locals.

In 1953, Corporal Shoichi Shimada was shot in the leg but soon recovered with the help of Onoda. On May 7th, 1954, he was killed by a search party when he fired upon his potential rescuers. Onoda and Kozuka would continue their mission to damage, gather intelligence on, and attack the so-called "enemy", which had no longer existed. On October 19th, 1972 during a skirmish, Kozuka was shot and killed by the police while he was burning a farmer's rice collection. Lieutenant Onoda was now left alone.

On February 20th, 1974, a Japanese explorer called Norio Suzuki found Onoda. Onoda still refused to surrender, but Suzuki had an idea to locate his original commanding officer, Major Yoshimi

Taniguchi. In March 1974, his former commanding officer travelled to the Philippines to fulfill his promise to return, and end his orders in person. The Philippine government, who was President Ferdinand Marcos, granted him a pardon, although he killed 30 innocent people on the island.

Finally, when he returned to

Japan, he was very popular, but he found it hard to adjust to the new Japan. He found it hard that it had decayed from its traditional values. He made an autobiography and in 1975, he left Japan for Brazil. There, he raised cattle and later opened many series of training schools. In his last years, Onoda said in an

interview: "Every Japanese soldier was prepared for death. But as an intelligence officer, I was ordered to conduct guerrilla warfare and not to die." I became

an officer, and I received an order. If I could not carry it out, I would feel shame.
I am very competitive." On January 16th, 2014, he died at the age of 91 years old. This information has come from
