I will be going back to Minnesota. We will drive. Then I fly from there to Arizona to see my wife's family.






Field Trips, Fun or Not?

Some people do not enjoy the field trips that we have because they might have


allergies, headaches, sensitivity to light or sound, and more. One new idea that the students of Highlands have is an allergy checklist on the permission slip.




White vs. Chocolate Milk



The Man who Fought in Three Armies

Yang Kyoungjong was a Korean soldier who had an awful journey to the Western Front by fighting alongside the Japanese, then the Soviets, and then the Germans. He was born on March 3, 1920, and died on April 7, 1992, at 72 years old.

Little is known about his life before World War II other than he was a native Korean living in Manchuria. At the age of 18 in 1938, he was forced to join the Japanese Army. Korea and many other Asian countries were colonies in Japan. He was drafted to the Kwantung Army of the Japanese Army in order to fight



Manchuria is an area the Japanese named as northeast Asia.



The Battle of Khalkhin Gol was from May to September 1939. The USSR and Japan fought an undeclared war which had over 100,000 troops. In the end, there was a peace treaty which made the Soviets and Mongolians victorious.

the Soviet Union. He fought for the Japanese for a year until the Soviet Army captured him in 1939 during the campaign of Battles of Khalkhin Gol, and was sent to a labor camp. This was fought between Mongolian and Soviet troops who were allies against the Japanese.

Since the Soviets were short on men to fight for the army against the German army, they wanted their prisoners of war to enlist in the Red Army. Soviet military officials made a decision in 1942 to help increase the number of troops by drafting thousands of prisoners of war. Then in 1942, Yang went to go fight for the

Red Army against the Germans on the European Eastern Front. A year later, he was captured in Eastern Ukraine during the Third Battle of Kharkov. Once again, he was pressed into fighting for the Wehrmacht.

He was sent to the Western Front as part of an Ost-Bataillone (Eastern

Battalion) in the 709th infantry division of the Wehrmacht. He would fight the troops on D-Day near the Utah beach. The Germans had to leave and Yang was captured. Initially, the US paratroopers thought all of them were Japanese, although three of them were from Turkestan while Yang was from Korea. He was sent to a prison camp in Britain until the end of the war. After the war, he went to the United States.




The Battles of Kharkov were fought between the Soviets and Germans. The Soviets were not as technologically advanced as the Germans leading the Germans to be victorious in the battle.

Although we don't know much about

Yang, we do know that he lived in Evanston, Illinois and died in 1992 at the age of 72. He didn't talk to anyone, not even his children about his experience from World War II.

When it gets to our school, they bring it in and our Quest worker heats it up and does whatever else it needs. It is inspected again for the last time. In conclusion, the food is fresh and it goes through four points of inspection.

Then I asked about our questions and concerns. I asked about allergy free food including meat, peanuts, and gluten. Mrs. Singletary said Quest has been working on those for awhile and she was proud to say that the new allergy free menu should come out in January!
